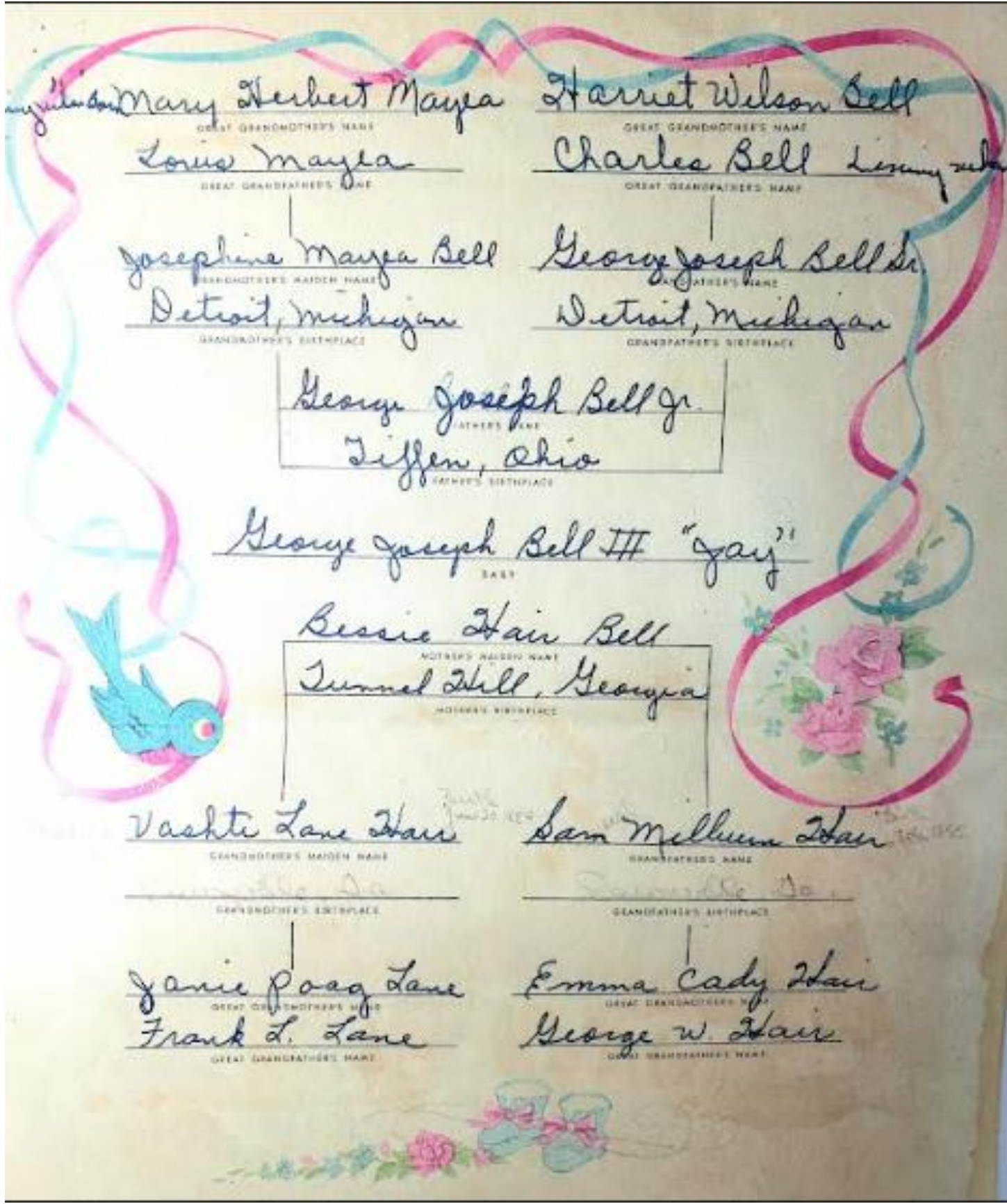


Alexander Bell sailing from Liverpool England to New York in 1862 on the ship John J. Boyd (or ship like this).

*Alexander's father or grandfather (of Scotland) married (in England or Canada) the only daughter

(She was adopted) of _____ Fordham (sp) of England. When Alexander (b.1866) left England with his bride to go to Canada, Fordham disinherited her. Fordham was a detestable person whose reputation lingers today. The Fordham estate was considerable and included stables and associated property that are now part of Oxford University, England. Alexander (b.1866) is also said to have been in the King's Calvary, Canada

Alexander Charles Bell (1866-1952) was a thoroughly colorful character with a varied background – a professional lightweight boxer at a time when boxing was outlawed, a drummer (traveling salesman) in the Southwest when they still used horses and buggies, a trainer of fighting cocks and who knows what else? We loved his stories and his character when we were kids, and our parents warned us not to believe everything he said. When he was in his eighties and I was in college, he was living in a cottage in the woods that his son Charles owned somewhere in upper Michigan. Granddad got sick one winter and spent a week alone and unaided. Charles said that's it, you can't live out there alone any more. Granddad said What's the worst that could happen? I could die, right? I'm going to die sometime. But Charles was adamant, so Granddad married the woman who came once a week to clean the place. But it didn't work out. She reported him to her brother the sheriff for keeping fighting cocks, and he kicked her out. By Larry Martz 2020

Jay spent a year in schools to be trained on the UYK-3 computer system.



The AN/UYK-3 is a ruggedized, transistorized digital computer developed by the Bunker Ramo Corporation in the 1960s. It was based on Bunker Ramo's BR-133 commercial computer design and was designated as AN/UYK-3 by the military. Designed for military applications, particularly for shipborne use, the AN/UYK-3 was known for its durability and substantial weight, exceeding a couple of hundred pounds. This computer was developed during a period when the electronics industry was transitioning from vacuum tube to transistor technology.



This computer had 8k of core memory.

1. **Magnetic Cores:**
 - o Each core is a small ferrite ring, about 1-3 mm in diameter.
 - o Data is stored as the magnetization direction of the core (clockwise or counterclockwise).
 - o A single core stores one bit of data: "1" or "0."

2. **Wires and Addressing:**
 - o Each core is threaded by three or four wires:
 - **X and Y Wires:** Select a specific core in a grid for reading or writing.
 - **Sense Wire:** Detects the polarity of the core during a read operation.
 - **Inhibit Wire (optional):** Prevents the core from flipping during specific operations.
- Pioneering Computers:** Used in iconic systems like the IBM 1401, PDP-8, and the Apollo Guidance Computer. Core memory represents an essential chapter in computing history, bridging the gap between mechanical and modern solid-state memory technologies.

Wullenweber & AN/UYK-3 Integration at Guam: (Jay stationed here 1/1969 - 6/1970)



1. **Wullenweber Antenna (CDA):**
 - o A circularly disposed antenna array, also called a **Wullenweber**, was used for **high-frequency direction finding (HFDF)** and **signals intelligence (SIGINT)**.
 - o It consisted of **two rings of antennas**, with the **outer ring handling high frequencies** and the **inner ring for low frequencies**, to monitor a wide range of radio signals.

- Its primary purpose was to intercept and locate enemy communications, often brief "blips," by triangulating signals from multiple stations.
 - Operators could dynamically switch between antenna elements using **reed relays** housed in glass enclosures, which were critical for signal routing and processing.
2. **AN/UYK-3 Computer:**
- The AN/UYK-3 was a rugged, transistorized digital computer used for **command, control, and communications (C3)** at naval bases like NAVCOMMSTA Guam.
 - Its roles included:
 - **Processing intercepted signals** from the Wullenweber, filtering and analyzing them for intelligence value.
 - **Triangulating signal sources** by correlating data from multiple antenna arrays.
 - **Automating signal monitoring**, flagging important transmissions.
 - **Relaying secure communications** to fleet command centers and other intelligence networks.
3. **Integration at NAVCOMMSTA Guam:**
- NAVCOMMSTA Guam used the Wullenweber and UYK-3 together to monitor enemy communications, support naval fleet operations, and relay intelligence during conflicts like the Vietnam War.
 - The base was part of a global network of intelligence-gathering stations, with Guam serving as a critical hub for Pacific operations.

Brennen now plays his dad at singles pickleball. He took classes on pickleball and is teaching his Trail Life group how to play pickleball.

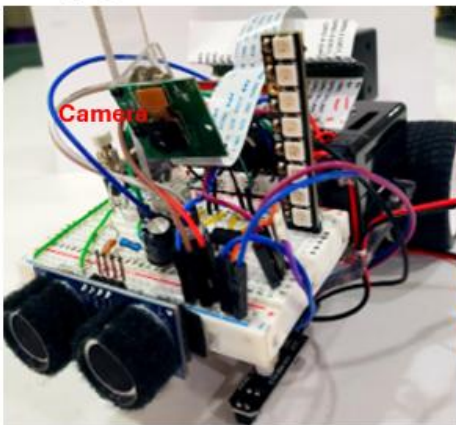

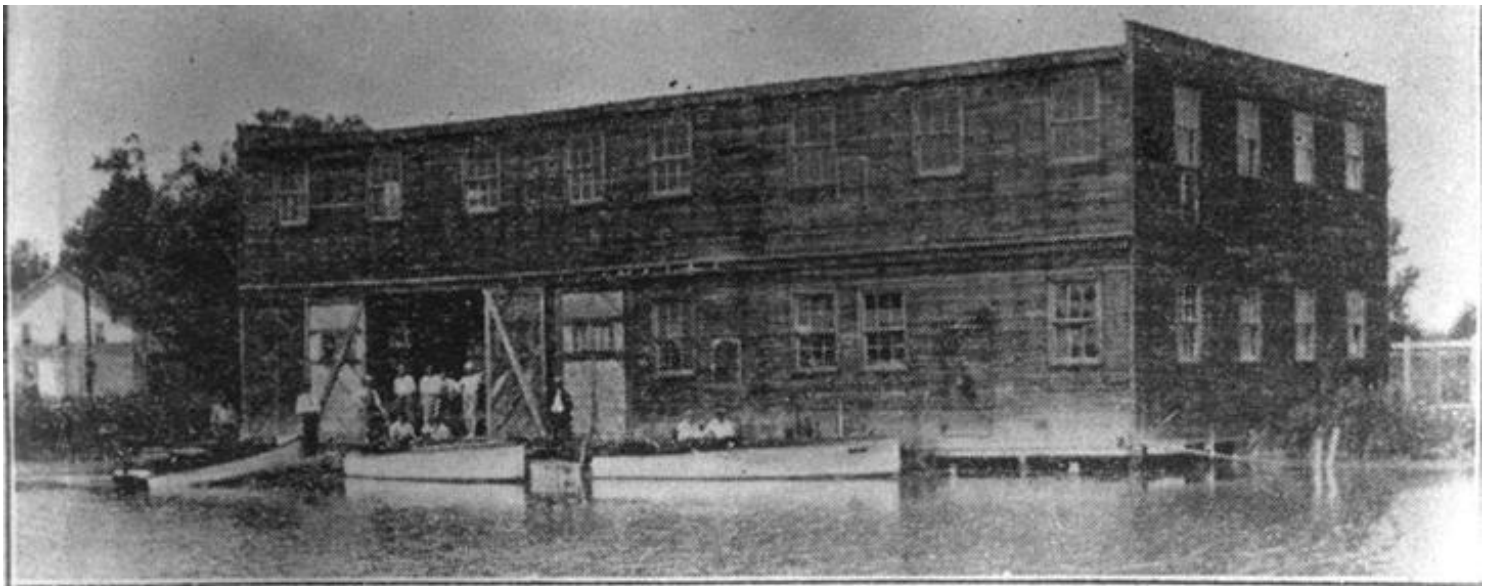

After the death of Louis T. Mayea in 1940, his sons, Louie and Herbert, took over the family business. The brothers decided the name "Mayea Boats" for their crafts was long, and hard for people to pronounce. The brothers turned to the shortened name their father, Louis, had sometimes used: May. From that point on, Mayea boats were known as Mays Crafts. The brothers were heavily influenced by their father's passion for hand crafted one-of-a-kind boats. All Mays Crafts are designed and built specifically for an enthusiast by third and fourth generation Mayea's who are carrying on knowledge that has been handed down from father to son. The Mayea family is perhaps the oldest family-owned custom wooden speedboat designer/builder in America.

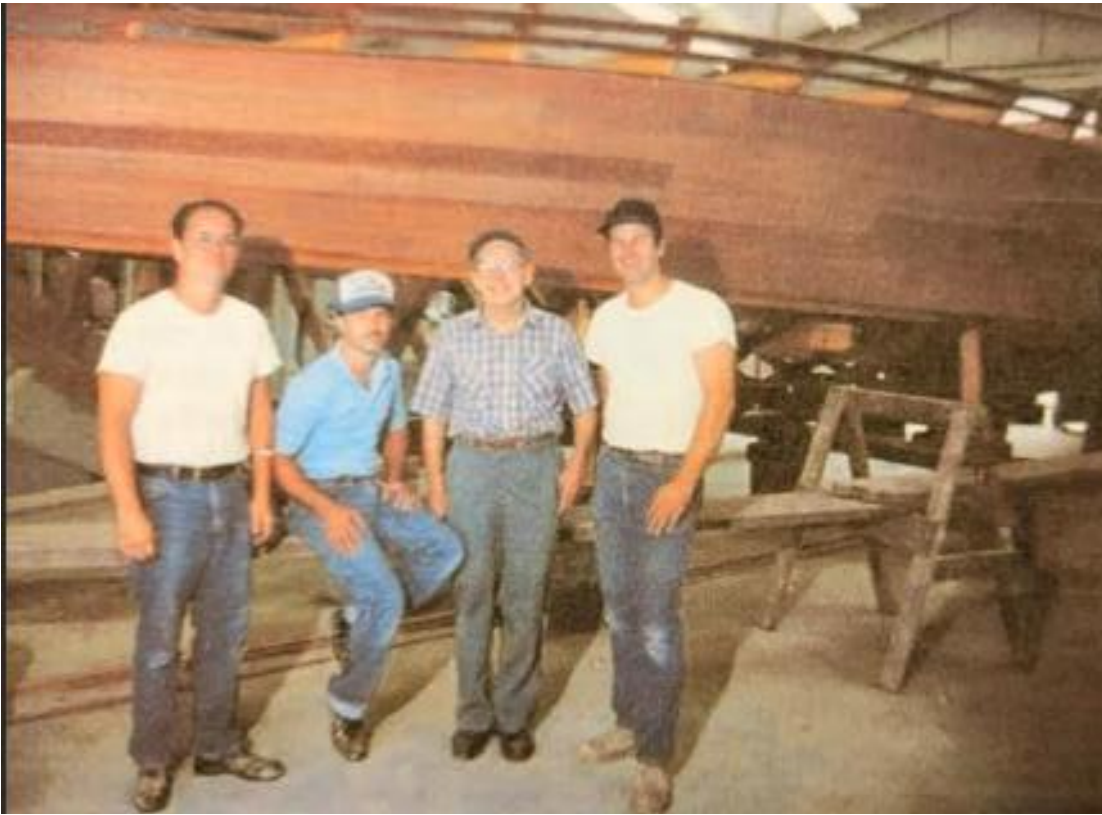
Each new Mays Craft starts out as a sketch that is then refined into a working hull model following the tradition handed down from Louis. The hull model is then digitized and put into a 3D computer modeling system where calculations are made and refined. The computer model of the hull molds are sent to be CNC machined within a thousandth of an inch. The molds are then hand assembled and lofted upright as the Mayea family has done for a century. The Mayea's use only the highest grade materials available to build Mays Crafts. Each boat is constructed out of hand picked straight grain mahogany. The backside of every plank and joint are coated with WestSystem® epoxy to ensure strength and water resistant properties. Paint or varnish is then applied by hand. Each varnished part on a Mays Craft receives up to 14 hand-applied coats to ensure a smooth high-gloss finish. All hardware and accessories are custom designed and hand made out of stainless steel. Mays Crafts are built with this blend of tradition and technology to achieve the highest possible standards.

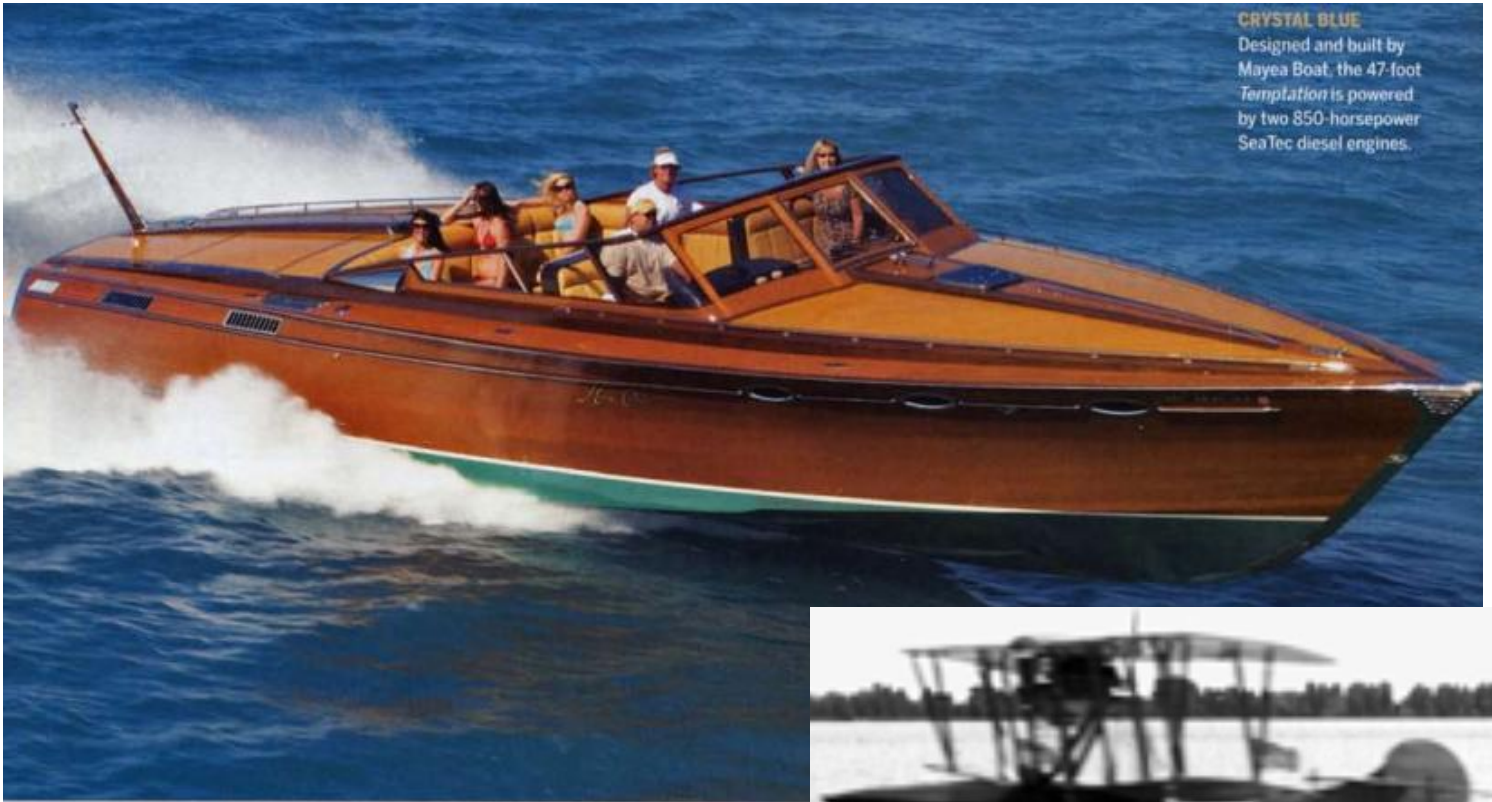

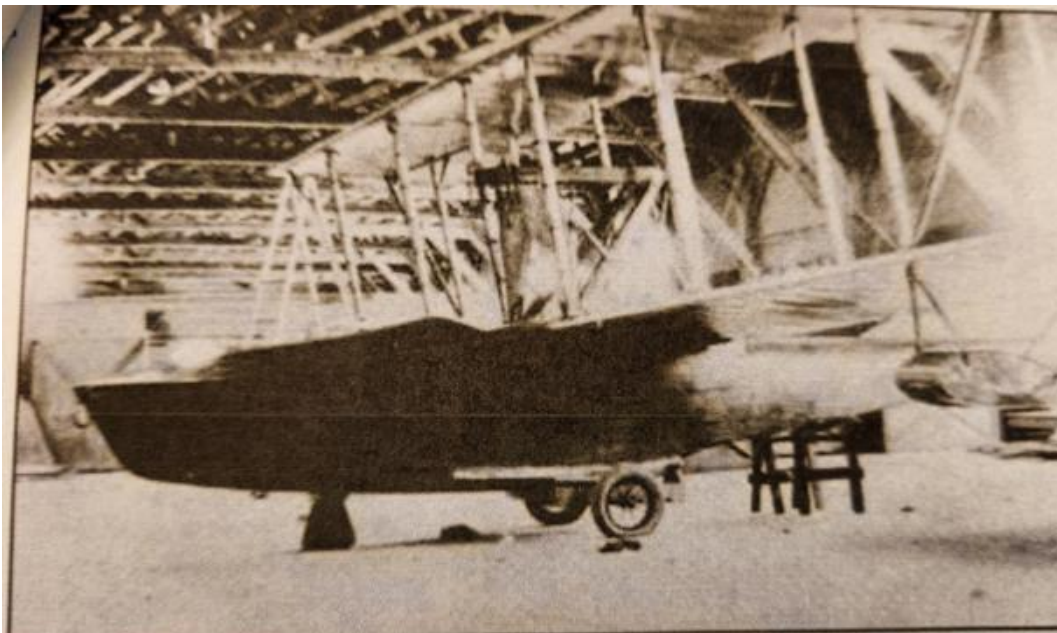

BOAT BUILDER DIES IN HOME

Founder Of Mayea Plant Had Been Ill Many Months

Fair Haven, July 19—Louis Theodore Mayea, 62, senior member of the Mayea Boat works here and Ira township fire chief since the department was organized 15 years ago, died Thursday in his home after a long illness.

Born in Detroit, Dec. 31, 1877, Mr. Mayea came to Fair Haven 21 years ago, and has been active in affairs here since. Before coming to Fair Haven, Mr. Mayea built the Kittie Hawk in 1914, said to have been the fastest speed boat of its kind at the time. He had been building boats since he was 13 years old. His sons, Louis and Herbert Mayea, are junior members of the firm which he founded shortly after coming here.

Mr. Mayea was named fire chief when the department was organized here in 1925, and has served since. He was instrumental in obtaining the township's first fire pump and truck.

He is survived by his widow, the former Mary Herbert; four daughters, Mrs. Robert Hubbard, New Baltimore; Mrs. George Bell, Greenfield, O.; Mrs. Ned Bentley, of Florida, and Mrs. Mabel Moore, Mt. Clemens; two sons, Louis and Herbert Mayea, and two brothers, Alex Mayea, Fair Haven, and Daniel Mayea, Tecumseh, Ont.

Funeral services will be held at 10 a.m. Monday in St. Mary's Catholic church, Anchorville. Rev. John Koelzer, pastor, will officiate. Burial will be in Sacred Heart cemetery, Anchorville.

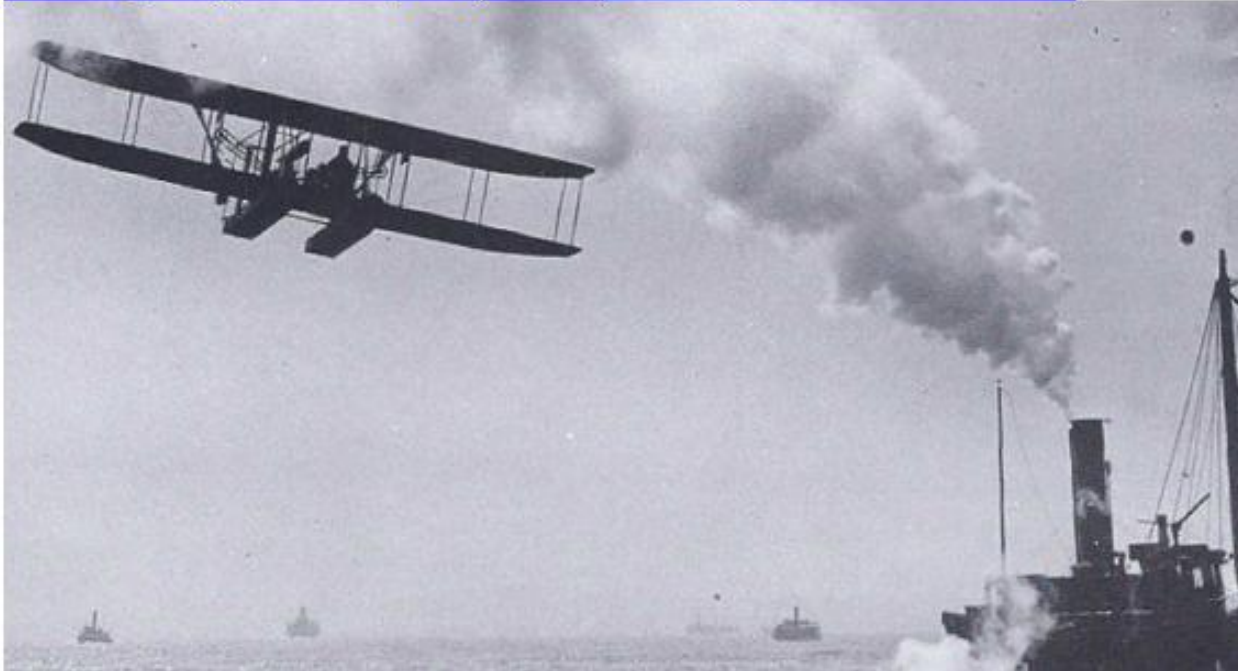

In 1910 the company (Wright Brothers Airplane Company) assembled a

demonstration team to help sell and showcase its plane, Russell and his cousin, Fred Alger, who was Manager of the Wright Company, put on one of the demonstration in June 1911 at the Detroit Country Club. A Wright Model B plane was used for the demonstration, with aviator Frank Coffyn as pilot. Coffyn was part of the original six man exhibition team trained by Orville Wright in 1910. By this time, however, most of the six-man team had either been killed in a crash or retired because of one. After the demonstration, Russell and Fred Alger, along with a Detroit businessman named William Metzger, started a Detroit syndicate to purchase the plane. After purchasing the plane, Russell because interested in the possibility of landing and taking off from the water, Russell believed that this type of flight would be safer and more fun than land-base flight. With this in mind he hired John L. Hacker to design and **Louis T. Mayea to build.**

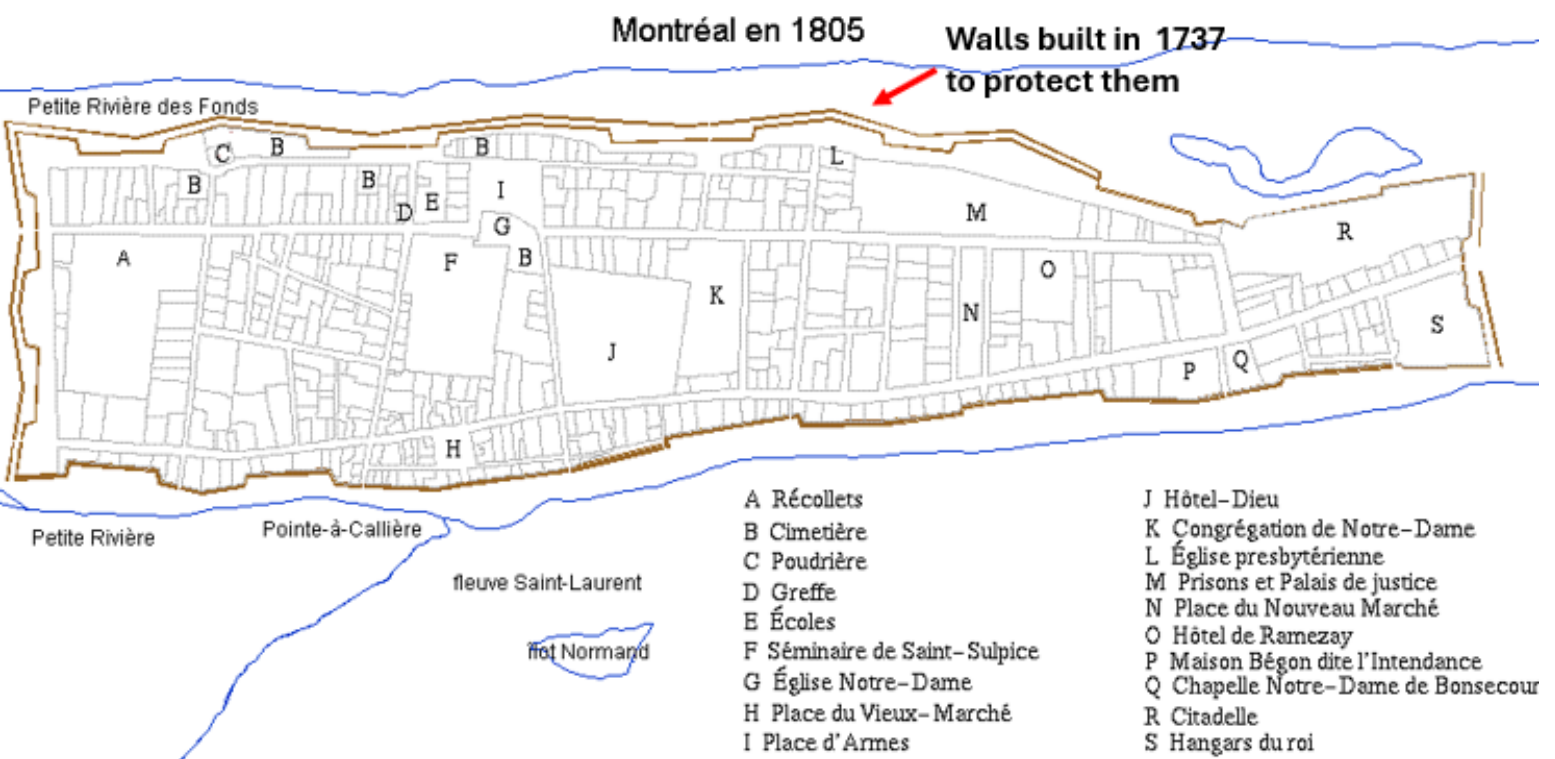

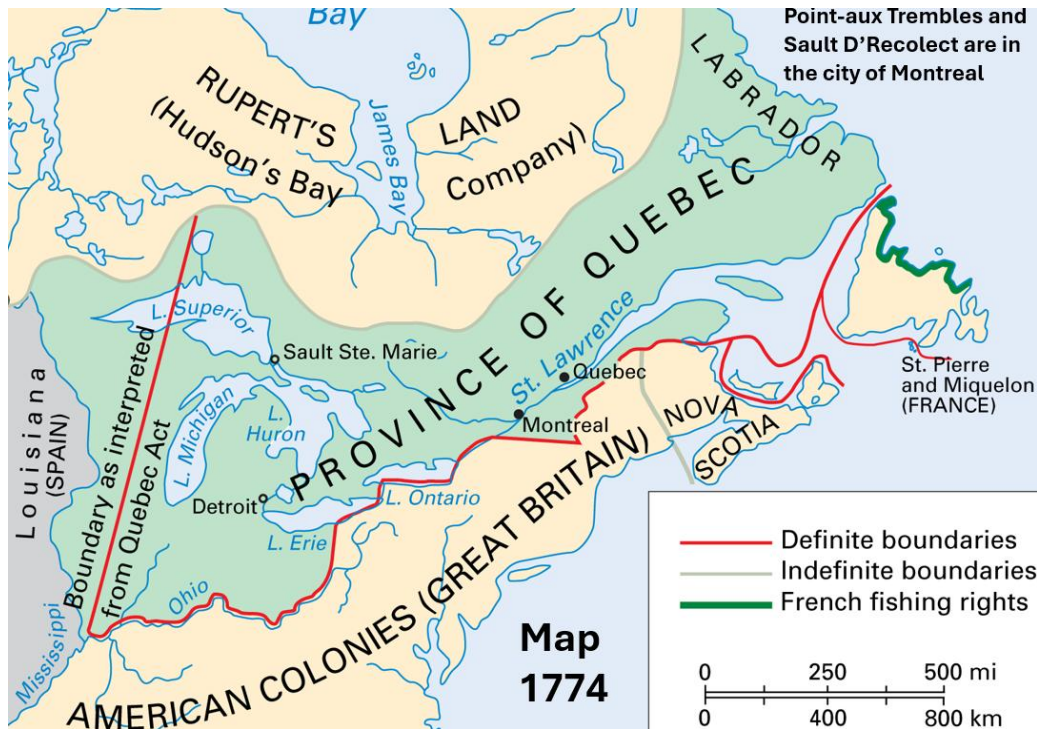

Fort Pointe-aux-Trembles was built around 1670 on the [Island of Montreal](#) in order to defend this part of the island which also included [Ville-Marie](#).

During the first part of 1660, the religious order of [Sulpicians](#) colonized this part of the island opposite [Ville-Marie](#). Due to a threatening situation with the [Iroquois](#), a fort was erected to defend the colonization of the Island of Montreal and protect the banks along the [Saint Lawrence river](#).

With the construction of this fort, the parish of [Pointe-aux-Trembles](#) became the second parish of the island of Montreal. The palissade fort surrounded the small village on the eastern side of the island. The fort has a mill and a chapel as well.

In 1693, land titles were given to the inhabitants who later became part of the community of *Vieux—Pointe-aux-Trembles*.

Towards the beginning of the following century, the [Chemin du Roy](#) was traced, and it became the first carriage road to link [Montreal](#) to [Quebec City](#).

In 1845, the municipality of [Pointe-aux-Trembles](#) was formed.

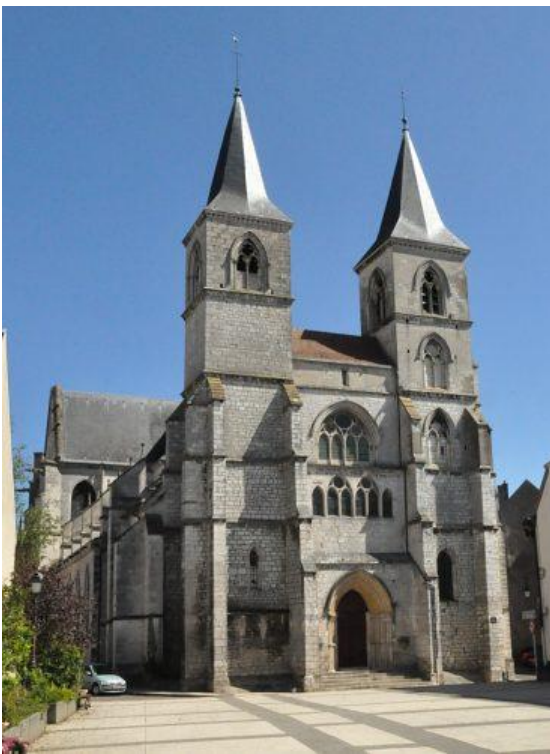

The Story of Louis Mayea: From Paris to Michigan – A Family Legacy

The Journey of Pierre Maguet: From Paris to New France

Pierre Maguet was born in **1663** in the **parish of Saint-Paul** in Paris, France—a bustling, densely populated neighborhood in the Marais district, home to both artisans and merchants. His parents, **Augustin Maguet** and **Françoise Goubilleau**, were common Parisians, likely of modest means. Life in Paris during this time was difficult for working families—crowded streets, disease, and limited opportunities for advancement.

When Pierre was just a boy, his father **passed away**, leaving his mother to raise him alone in a city that offered little support for widows and children. In 1670, when Pierre was only **about 7 years old**, he and his mother made a life-changing decision: they would sail to **New France**, the growing French colony in North America.

It's not known whether they were sponsored by the state, joined a private migration effort, or were connected to any religious or trade group. What is clear is that **they boarded a ship in La Rochelle** or another western port and endured the long Atlantic voyage to the settlement of **Québec**, in the heart of the new colony.

A New Life in a New World

Arriving in New France was both exciting and daunting. The colony was still relatively small, consisting mostly of scattered farms, a few fortified towns, and wide stretches of wilderness. For a young boy like Pierre, the difference from Paris must have been overwhelming—but also full of promise. Life here was hard, but land was available, and the rigid social structure of France didn't apply in the same way. A person could make something of themselves.

By the time he reached adulthood, Pierre had likely taken up farming or skilled labor, either working for a local seigneur (landowner) or acquiring his own land as part of the colony's settlement incentives.

Marriage and Family

In **1686**, at about **23 years old**, Pierre married **Catherine Perthuis**, the daughter of early colonist **Jacques Perthuis** and Marie-Madeleine Pichon. The Perthuis family had also come from France and settled along the **Rivière des Prairies**, not far from Montréal.

Catherine's family was part of the growing settler community, and their union was likely seen as a good match. Together, **Pierre and Catherine had multiple children**, helping populate the colony, as was strongly encouraged by both church and state.

The French government supported these growing families through incentives like land grants, livestock, and even dowries for settler marriages. Pierre would have used his labor and farming to build a modest but stable life along the riverbanks of the St. Lawrence Valley.

Later Years and Legacy

Pierre lived a long life for the time, passing away in **1725** at the age of **about 62**, in **Rivière-des-Prairies**, Quebec. He had witnessed the transformation of New France from a remote outpost to a growing colony with churches, schools, farms, and fortified towns.

He left behind a large family, and **many of his descendants remained in Canada**, becoming part of the founding generations of **French-Canadian families**. 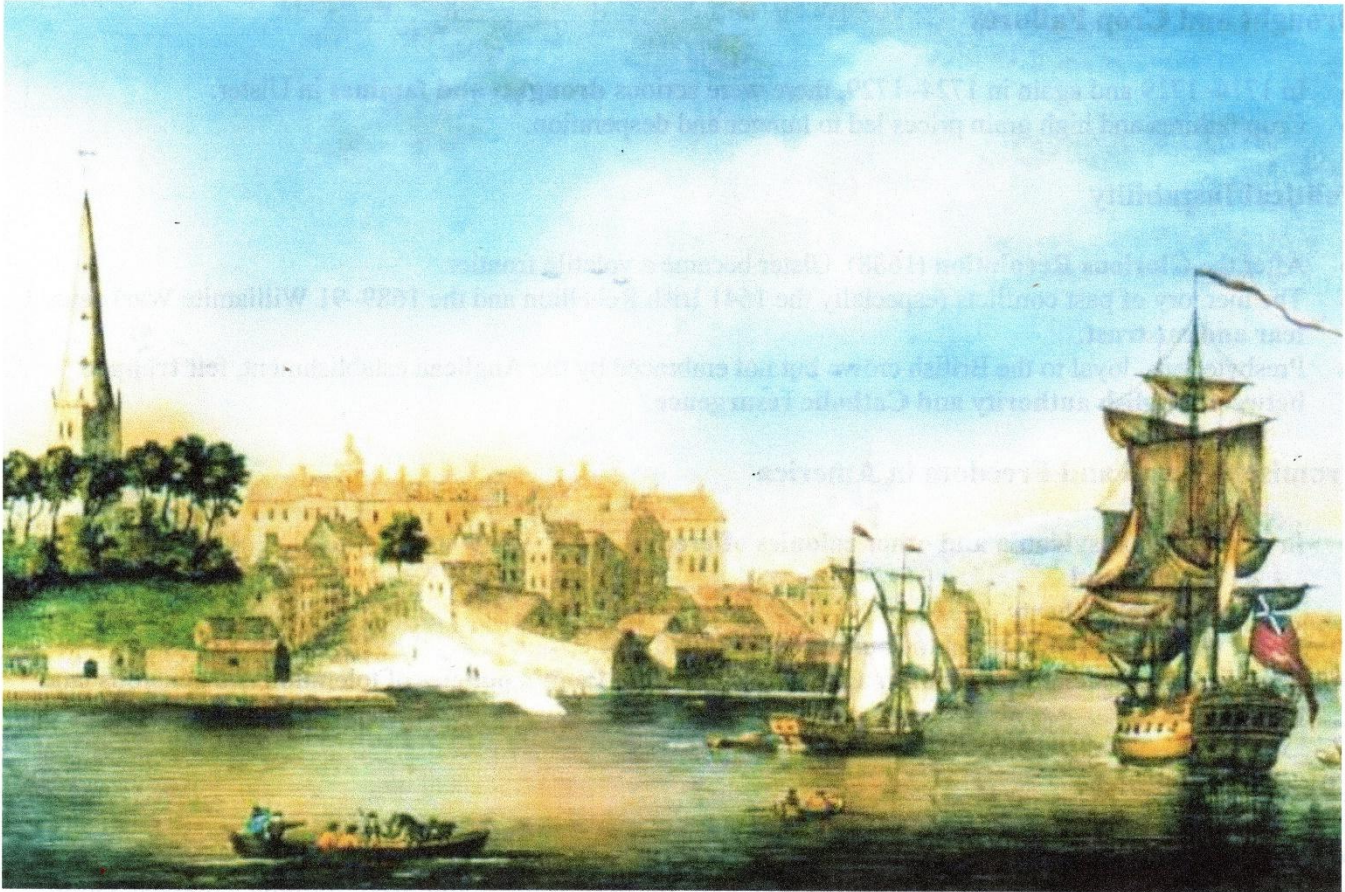

By the 1770s the voyage across the Atlantic, on average, took 7 weeks with the fastest being 27 days by Jupiter to **Philadelphia** from Derry in 1772 and the slowest being 17 weeks by General Wolfe also to **Philadelphia** from Derry in the same year.

1. Religious Discrimination (Penal Laws)

Grey Abbey, a Cistercian abbey-monastery located on the north side of the village, dating from 1193. It was founded by Affreca, daughter of Godred Olafsson, King of the Isles, and wife of John de Courcy, Anglo-Norman conqueror of the province of Ulster.

The site of the abbey was on the Ards Peninsula, 7 miles (11 km) from Newtownards, at the confluence of a small river and Strangford Lough. Architecturally it is important as the first fully gothic style building in Ulster; it is the first fully stone church in which every window arch and door was pointed rather than round headed.

Tradition says that Affreca founded the abbey in thanksgiving for a safe landing after a perilous journey at sea. The abbey was colonised with monks from Holmcultram in Cumberland, with which it maintained close ties in the early years. The construction of the stone church began almost immediately. In 1222, and again in 1237. The Latin name of the abbey is *Iugum Dei*, which means "Yoke of God". Little is known of the abbey's history, although it appears to have been almost completely destroyed during the invasion of Edward Bruce (1315–18).

The abbey was dissolved in 1541. In the same year part of the monastic property was granted to Gerald Earl of Kildare. The monastery was physically destroyed during the military operations of the Elizabethan era. In 1572, Bryan O'Neill burnt Grey Abbey to stop it being used as a refuge for English colonists trying to settle in the Ards Peninsula.

During the 17th century the church nave was re-roofed and served as a parish church until 1778.

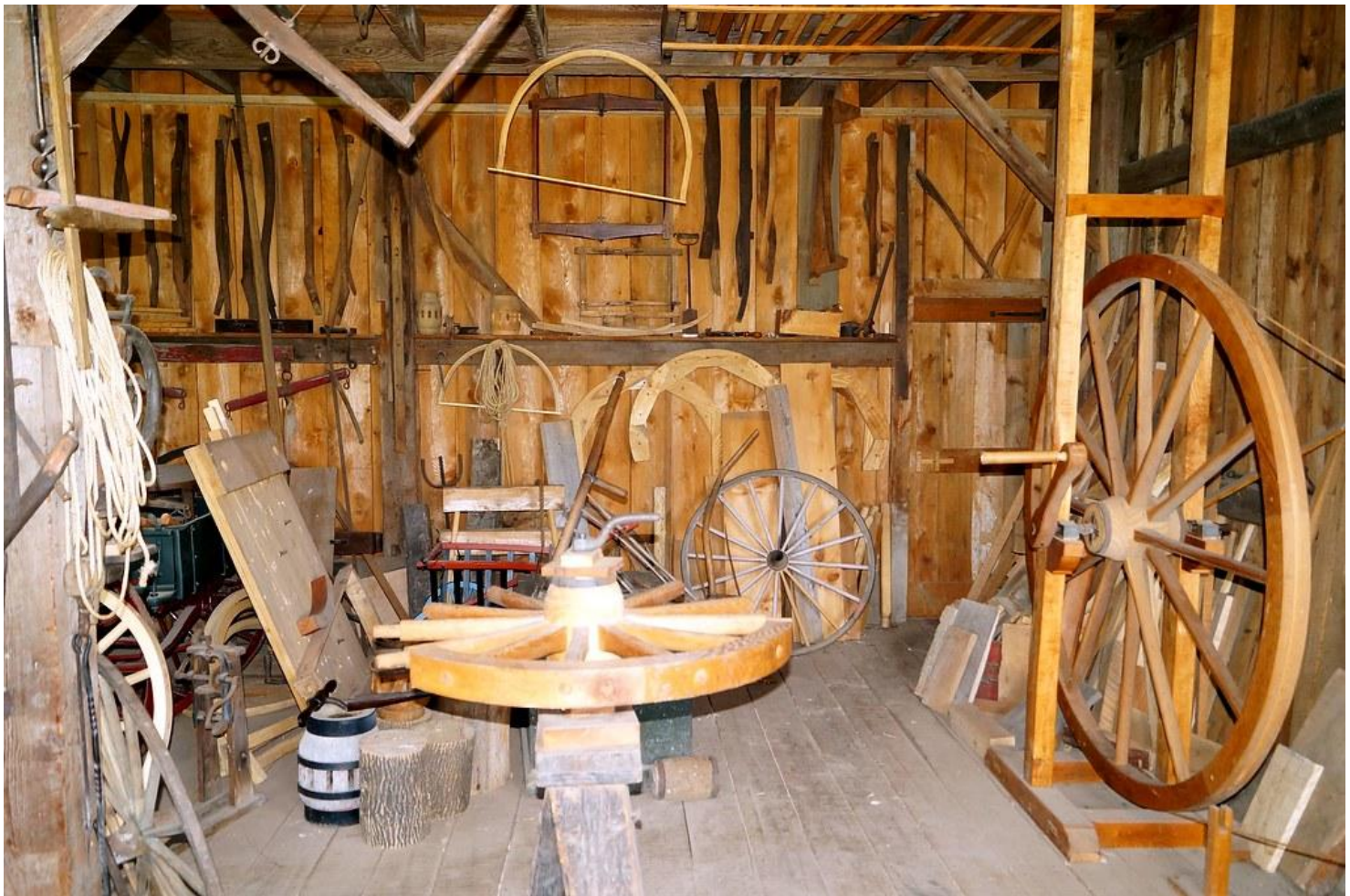

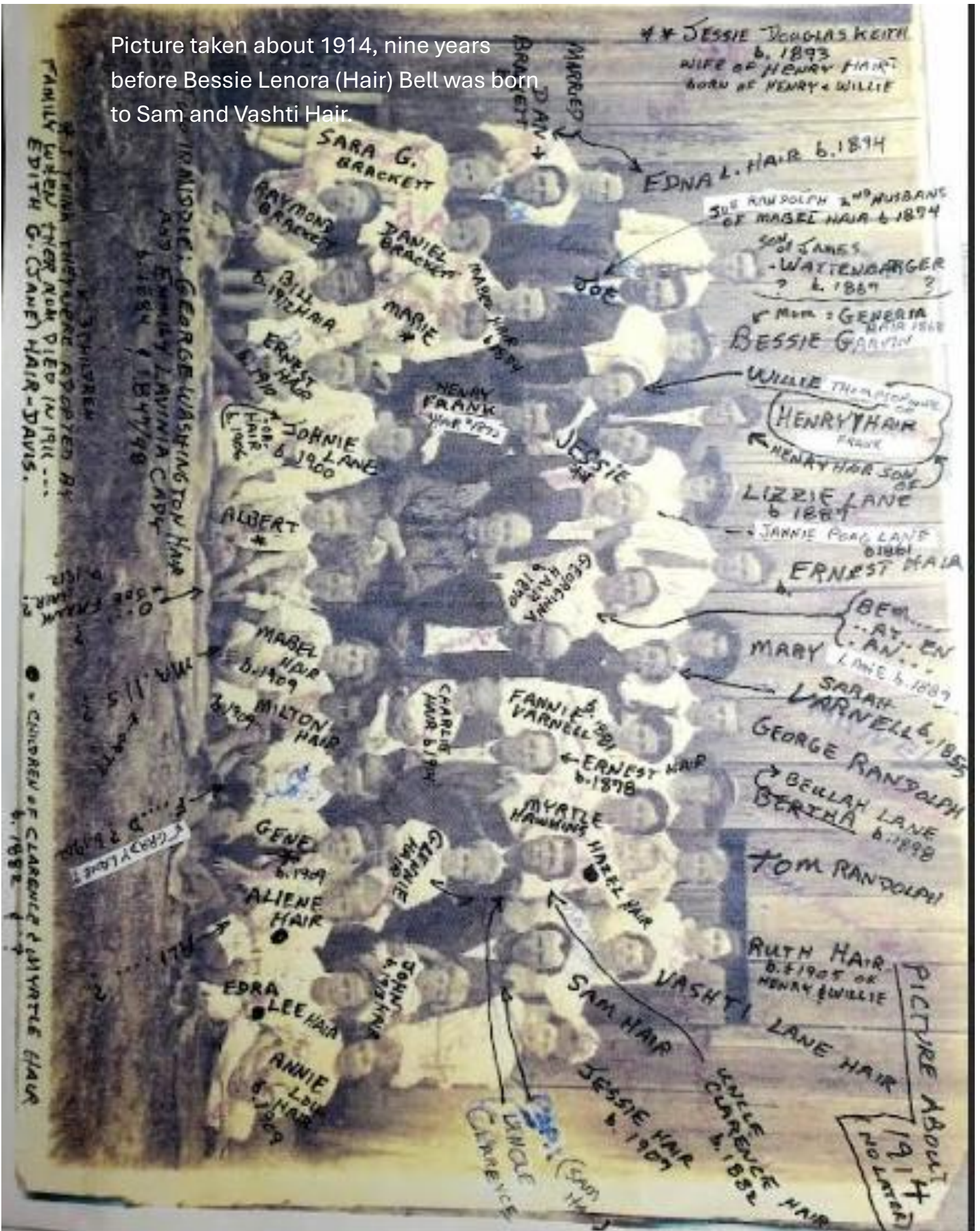

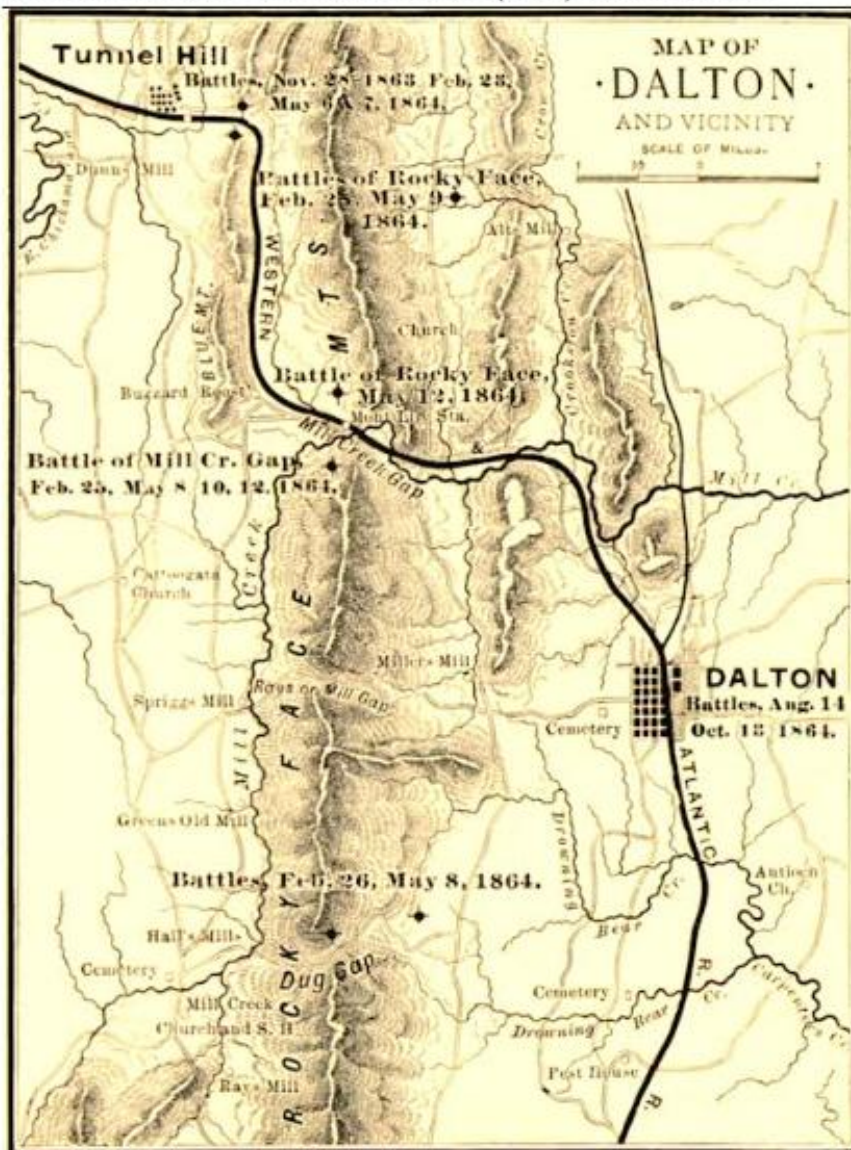

History of Dalton Georgia

Whitfield County was formed in 1851 and named for Reverend George Whitefield who had come to Georgia from Britain as a missionary. Dalton was originally called Cross Plains.

The county seat was placed in Dalton which earned a place in Civil War history as a Confederate hospital and manufacturing town.

One of the Civil War's bloodiest and most decisive battles was fought just twenty miles away in Chickamauga, after which the Confederates retreated from the area and made their first "strategic withdrawal" of troops. In May of 1864, the Atlanta campaign began when General Sherman's troops met Johnson's Confederates at Tunnel Hill, Dug Gap and along Rocky Face Ridge. Thirty-two Civil War markers stand today commemorating important activities in the area. Locations like Dug Gap Battle Park, where breastworks used by Confederate soldiers are preserved, bring a sense of immediacy to the past century.

Also the site of several bouts during the War Between the States was the town Tunnel Hill, named for the Western and Atlantic railroad tunnel which is cut right thru a mountain. In its day, the tunnel was considered an astounding feat of engineering.

A virtual industrial revolution came to the area when a young farm girl named Catherine Evans Whitener revived the colonial art of tufting in the early 1900s. Whitener made a tufted bedspread which she was able to sell for two dollars and fifty cents. That first bedspread represents the birth of a significant cottage industry in Dalton. Other women began to sew for extra income, and by the early 1920s, the success of these businesswomen had created quite a stir. Bedspreads led to scatter rugs and other products by the 1930s, and these new exports saved Dalton and Whitfield County from the pangs of depression felt by other parts of the nation.

By the 1950s, advances in machinery, technology and dyeing methods opened the doors to the modern carpet industry. The entrepreneurial spirit of the people of this Northwest Georgia Community turned a cottage bedspread industry into a multi-billion dollar carpet industry.

CHURCHES AND SCHOOLS: SHADY GROVE : It is recorded (Record Book A, P. 203) that on August 19, 1852, **Stephen A. Cady** deeded 2 1/2 acres to "William Callahan, Rudd Morgan and John Morgan, Trustees, for a meeting house and school house to be called Shady Grove." On this property a large log building was erected which served the community several years, Methodist and Baptist preachers alternately addressing the union congregation. After the membership had increased in numbers the two denominations--Baptist and Methodist--assumed responsibility for separate church buildings nearby, which have since been known as Grove Level and Pleasant Grove, each church retaining a part of the original name. The Baptist members of the Shady Grove congregation had organized their church one day previous to the date of the deed made by **Dr. Stephen Cady** to the community church, as the church records now list Grove Level's organization as October 18, 1852. However, they worshipped in the community church of Shady Grove until August 11, 1874, when Duke Richardson. by gift and donation deeded a portion of land lying immediately in the forks of the Cleveland and Benton roads to the Grove Level Baptist church (Book p. 134). Here was constructed their building, On June 9, 1906, Victor C. Richardson deeded to Jos, G. Robertson, A. P. Dantzler and W. H. Isbill, one-half acre lying: east of one acre already purchased for the consideration of six dollars (Book T, p. 335). The first members of Grove Level were Duke Richardson and **wife Emily**, Henry Brooker and wife Jane, Jacob Danizler and wife, William Sapp and wife Sarah, Martin Workman and wife Nancy Ann, William Russell and wife Cynthia Ann, Eliza Ann Moore, R. Morgan and Matilda Morgan, Among pastors who served Grove Level are : Wm. A. Wright, Brittain, M, Gambrel!, J. M. Stansberry, Martin M. Clontz, Isaac. Watkins, J. M, Stone, J. T. Nichols, Lee Taylor, Charlie Maples, J. A. Maples, J. E. Morgan, H. A. Winstead, J. O. Dantzler, J. W. Sosby and W. E. Roberts. PLEASANT GROVE The Methodist members of Shady Grove purchased land and erected a building on the Cleveland highway south of the original structure. The first acre of the new location was deeded by Anthony Bolander for the consideration of fifteen dollars to Martin P. Berry, **Isaac N. Hair**, Thos, A. Tye, John Lewis Bender and S. C. Swan. This was on July 26, 1873. The second deed records that on March 31, 1876, John D. Williamson gave five and one-fourth acres "**for the cause of Christianity**" to P, Berry, Swan, J. M. Bailey, J. L. Bender and L. W. Quillian. An additional grant of one and three-fourths acres was given by Cephus Stradley on September 7, 1885, to J, L. Bender, James Kirk and T. A. Tye. In the deed made by John D. Williamson to M. P. Berry et al one acre of land was reserved ("to be selected and measured by said party of the first part") for the purpose of erecting a cottage and stables to be used at the camp meetings held annually at Pleasant Grove. A church and a school building were erected on these grounds, also a huge arbor where the Whitfield County Sunday school convention has been held for about sixty years, In addition to the trustees named in the deeds were others prominent in the development. of the church's history. Among them were the Brooker family, the Jewell family, the Cady family and the Kirk family. This church is one of a group comprising the Varnell circuit. (For list of pastors, see Varnell Methodist).

Mrs. Emma Lavinia Hair, aged 77 years, died Wednesday, October 23, 1914, at the home of her son Clarence S. Hair, at the old home-
stead, after a lingering illness extending over the past two years.

Mrs. Hair was born within the present limits of Whitfield county, then known as Murray county, in the year 1847, and has resided here all of her life. She was the daughter of Dr. Stephen Cady, a native of Vermont, and the maiden name of her mother was Mary Payne Harriot, of Tennessee.

The deceased was married in 1867 to George W. Hair, who preceded her in death in 1918, of which union five boys and five girls were born, six of whom survive.

Mrs. Hair was a woman of high and noble Christian ideals, which she inculcated in the lives of her children; she was a consistent member of the Methodist church from her childhood and was at all times "soothed and sustained by an unflinching trust" in her Master. She performed those gentle, Christian ministrations which endeared her to neighbors. She nurtured the needy, soothed the sick, sympathized with the sorrowing and "went about doing good."

Her life was a beautiful exemplification of Christian principles and it may be truly said of her, "she hath done what she could."

Her charity was not confined to creed or church, and "she was ever ready with a word of good cheer to bring back a smile, to banish a tear". A pioneer is gone; a link with the yesteryears is broken, and the hallowed memories of a life linger as a sweet benediction.

Mrs. Hair is survived by four sons, H. P., I. E., G. S. and Rev. S. S. Hair; two daughters, Mrs. Habel Randolph and Mrs. Nina Brackett; and one brother, E. E. Cady, two sisters, Mrs. Eliza Richardson and Mrs. Harriet Cady, all of this county; forty-three grand-children and ten great grand-children.

The funeral services were held at Dawnville Friday morning, Nov. 6, 1914, at the First Methodist church of Dalton, officiating, followed by interment in the Dawnville cemetery.

Six grand-sons acted as pallbearers. A large concourse of sorrowing friends attended the funeral, in sincere attestation of the genuine worth and esteem in which the deceased was held.

Mr. George W. Hair, aged 70 years, died at his home near Dawnville, Sunday night at 9 o'clock, following a brief illness, and in his passing, the county has lost one of its most valued citizens.

Mr. Hair was a well known and highly esteemed farmer, being a Confederate veteran and a loyal member of the Methodist church. He served with distinction throughout the Civil war, and was a prominent member of Joseph E. Johnston camp, United Confederate Veterans.

The deceased was one of the leading men in his community being respected and esteemed for the excellent gentleman he was. In church work he took a prominent part, as he did in all things for the betterment of his community. His loss will be missed by Georgians as well as neighbors.

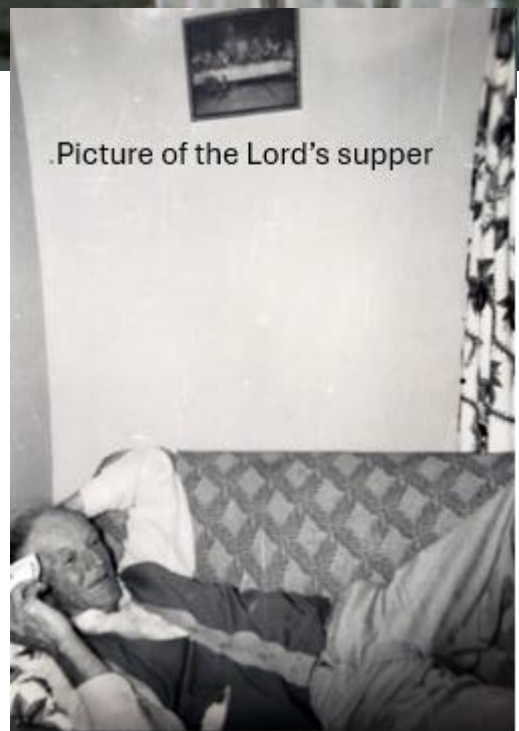

Sam & Vashti's Dawnville home adjoined the school ground and on their property Sam & Vashti had a small store and a gas pump (abt 1935). Vashti would cook food in the back of the store to sell. The schoolteachers would come to Sam & Vashti's house for lunch but later the school prohibited them from leaving the school grounds during lunch. So... Stephen, Margaret, and Bessie (teenagers) were enlisted to come home from school during lunch to carry lunches to the teachers. Sam & Vashti also kept boarders.

****The following is adapted from "Joe Hair, Self Made Man" by Mary Hair, his wife.****

Sam Hair received his calling to preach at the Methodist church where he attended. Because he lacked college (and any way to go to college) the Methodist would not have him. Sam became a Baptist preacher serving many churches in the Dawnville/Tunnel Hill area (His renown lingers today {1999}). He was still a farmer and preaching helped little to support his large family. Sometimes the family would do Sam's farm chores so he could hold weeklong revivals. Tunnel Hill provided them with a parsonage when Sam served there. ... Christmas would always find oranges or some kind of fruit in the children's stockings. One Christmas Joe & Ernest received a cross cut saw which pleased them because it made their work much easier. Joe had no toys and so made his own wagons to ride down the hills. After her stroke Grandmother Hair (Emma Lavina Cady) lived for a time with Sam & Vashti, and Joe tells how if you got too close to her she would pinch you! And she could really pinch! ... Saturday was bath night and the three boys would take turns getting to be the first to use the bath water they had to share. Not having a toothbrush, they would use a sweet gum twig and soot from under the eye of the cook stove to keep their teeth white. Aunt Vera would bring her husbands old socks for the boys to wear. Joe would rather wear them up side down than wear a mended sock. They did get new brogans (high top boots) at the start of each winter. ... Sam was very strict ... especially with the boys! He believed "Spare the rod and spoil the child". He would spank them with his belt (when they needed it) until they cried, and then until they stopped crying. Sam devised a way to keep milk cool and unspoiled overnight. He would set the milk jug in the middle of a tub of water on the porch and drape white cloth over the side of the tub. The water wicked up the cloth and evaporation would keep everything cool. Joe had his first candy bar at age 21. One time, being mischievous, Joe put cattails in the school furnace causing school to be closed for the day. No one ever knew who did it until after three weeks Joe's papa hears of the occurrence and immediately knows who did it. Joe admitted his mischief and had to confess to the school principal (who was also his Minister). Sam's family always sat on the first pew and Vashti would maintain discipline during the service by pinching a misbehaving child. Joe was baptized in the creek near Tunnel Hill.

There are several problems concerning the pastoral appointments for the years 1860-1911. One problem is why aren't the names of so many, who obviously were pastors of the circuits of which Mt. Zion was a part, not included in any of the lists of former pastors in any of the histories of the church written previously? A second problem is difficulty assigning the exact years of service for those who are included in the histories. The answer to both problems is probably explained by the fact that the church was blessed with local preachers, and the entire area with supply pastors, who served Mt. Zion from time to time, even though someone else was pastor-in-charge of the Circuit itself.

For instance, Mt. Zion was served by William McNabb, H. D. Keith, David Delk and Sam Hair, all local preachers. (20) Because of the number of churches on the circuits, the distances involved, and because travel was so slow and arduous, local preachers were used extensively. The churches which they served looked upon them, with good reason, as the pastor of the church. This is probably why some of the pastors appointed by the Conference as pastors of the Circuit are not remembered.

Thomas Lane of Lawne’s Creek, Surry County, Virginia (1630–1709)

with Elizabeth Sheppard and their Colonial Virginia Legacy

Thomas Lane was born around 1630–1634, most likely in Long Bennington, Lincolnshire, England. Records suggest he immigrated to Virginia by the early 1650s, possibly as part of a headright brought over by William Debnam. By 1661, he had settled in the Lawne’s Creek Parish area of Surry County, Virginia, a prominent early settlement just across the James River from Jamestown.

On June 11, 1661, Thomas married Elizabeth Sheppard, the widow of Faulk Jones. Elizabeth had a daughter from her first marriage, and she and Thomas went on to raise a family together in Virginia. They became part of the planter class — landowners in the colony who were engaged in tobacco farming and local affairs.

Thomas gave depositions in 1670 and 1674, stating his age as 36 and 39, which places his birth between 1633 and 1635. He patented land in 1682 and appears in multiple deeds and wills from the late 1600s to early 1700s. He died in January 1709, and Elizabeth likely passed around the same time.

Children of Thomas Lane and Elizabeth Sheppard

1. Thomas Lane Jr. (born ~1660, Surry Co. – died 1733/34)

He inherited land from his father and continued the family’s presence in Surry County. Thomas Jr. married Jane Flood, and they had several children, including:

Mary Lane, who married John Hart

Rebecca Lane, who married into the White family

Thomas Lane III, who continued the name into the next generation

His will was proved in 1734.

2. Col. Joseph Lane Sr. (born ~1665, Surry Co. – died after 1730, likely in North Carolina)

Joseph Lane moved from Surry County into Isle of Wight County, VA, and later into Bertie or Halifax County, North Carolina. He became known as Colonel Joseph Lane, likely due to militia service or local leadership. A land deed from 1710 records him transferring 200 acres he inherited from his father Thomas to his brother, confirming both the family relationship and their landowning status.

Joseph married a woman named Julian (possibly Julianne), and many of his descendants helped establish the Lane family line in North Carolina, including some who went on to serve in government and military roles in the colonial and early American periods.

Legacy

Thomas Lane’s origins in England are not definitively proven, but family researchers commonly link him to Richard Lane and Alice Burwell of Lincolnshire — though documentation is still lacking. He clearly became a prominent part of early Virginia’s planter society. The family’s move from Surry County, VA to Isle of Wight and eventually North Carolina mirrors the westward expansion of many colonial families seeking land and opportunity.

Today, the Lane family name continues across the South — a legacy that traces back to one man’s journey across the Atlantic and a homestead built along the banks of Lawne’s Creek.

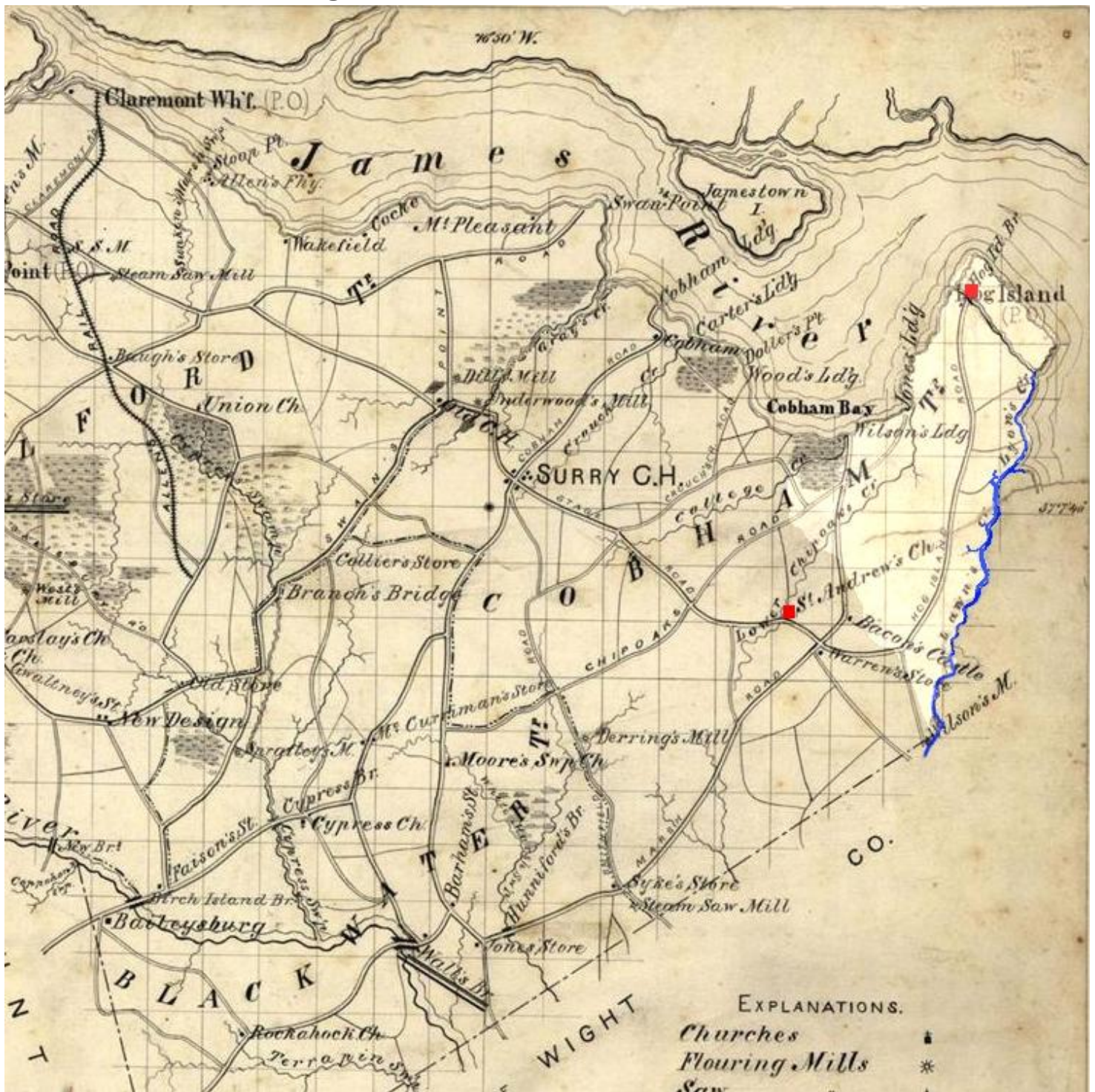
What is a “headright”?

The **headright system** was a land grant program used in **Virginia and other colonies** to encourage settlement. Here's how it worked: If a person **paid for their own passage** (or someone else’s) from England to Virginia, they were granted **land — usually 50 acres** — as a reward. These people were referred to as **“headrights”** — essentially, each **“head”** brought into the colony earned land for the sponsor. Wealthier colonists or investors often **sponsored the transportation of multiple people** (including indentured servants or laborers) in order to accumulate large tracts of land.

What is a “land patent”?

A **land patent** was a legal document issued by the colonial authorities (usually the governor on behalf of the king) that granted a person the **right to own and settle a specific piece of land**.

Thomas Lane from England lived in Lawnes creek from 1668 - 1703



By 1640 James City County's population south of James River was sufficient to support a new parish, and Lawne's Creek Parish was established. Southwark Parish was separated from James City Parish in 1647, and Surry County was separated from James City County five years later. Soon afterward Arthur Allen built his Jacobean brick house, now known as Bacon's Castle because it was occupied as a fort or "castle" during Bacon's Rebellion in 1676.

The part of James City County that became Surry County was inhabited by the Quiyoughcohanocks, allies of the Algonquian Powhatan Confederacy, when Jamestown settlers visited in 1607. Early settlers reported that they were entertained very graciously during their first visit. John Rolfe's marriage to Pocohontas in 1614 helped to keep peace between Indians and English settlers for a time. Pocohontas died in England in 1616, however, and by 1622 the Powhatans had decided to rid their lands of the English settlers. On Friday, 11 April 1622, Indians living in English settlements all over the small colony rose up and attacked their English hosts,

murdering and mutilating them in their homes. At Pace's Pains on the south shore of the James one Indian, a Christian named Chanco, refused to murder Richard Pace, warning him of the impending massacre instead. Three hundred and forty-seven English people were killed then. A list made the following February showed 1,277 people left alive in the colony.

100 years later:

Reports to the Bishop of London by the ministers of Lawne's Creek and Southwark parishes in the year 1724 were recorded by Bishop Meade. They were not prosperous parishes. In 1738 Albemarle Parish was created from those parts of Lawne's Creek and Southwark parishes that lay southwest of Blackwater River. The remaining parts of Lawne's Creek and Southwark were united into Southwark Parish. The entire area of Albemarle Parish was incorporated into Sussex County when it was formed from the southwestern end of Surry County in 1754.

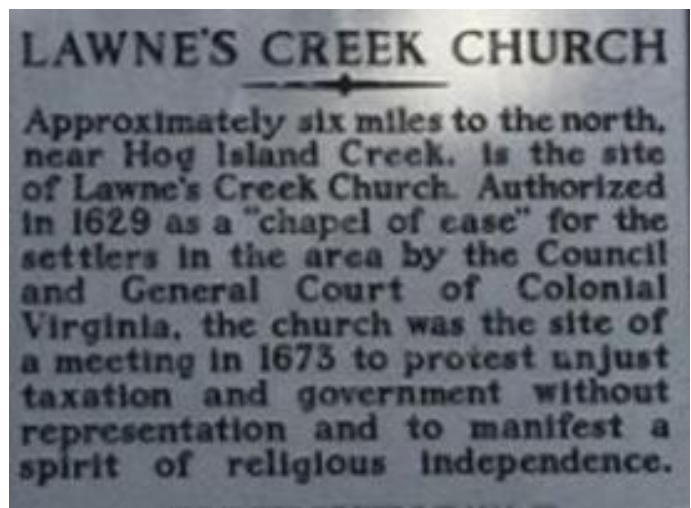

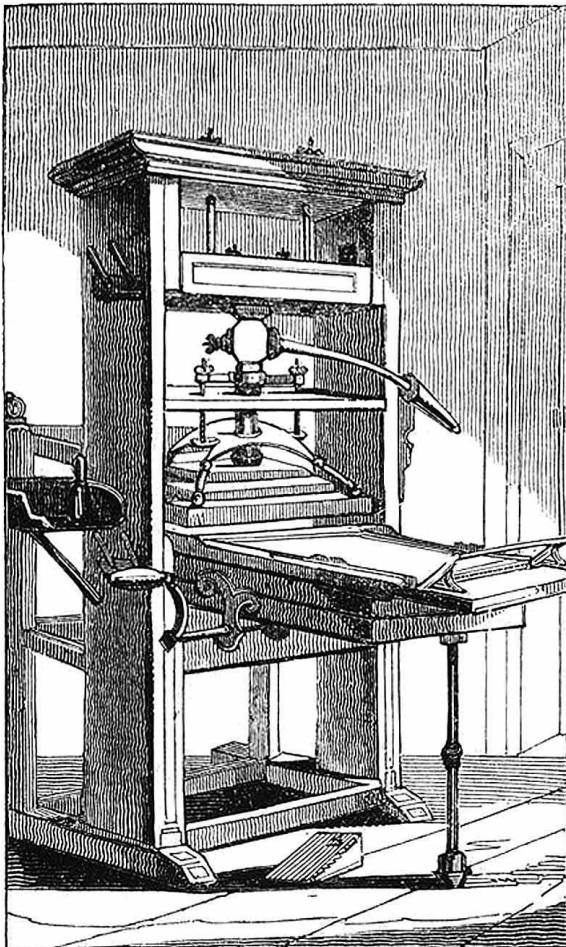

1620 - Invention of the Dutch press

Amsterdam cartographer, publisher and printer Willem Janszoon Blaeu improves the printing press by adding a counterweight to the pressure bar so that the platen rises automatically. The revised design, called the 'Dutch Press', largely remains in use until Stanhope introduces an iron cast press in **1804**.

Here is my theory regarding the birthplace of Thomas Lane: To determine a possible birth place, it is important to review all information that is available, including known facts, historical context and biological connections. Thomas Lane may have been transported to Virginia in 1653. (1) Based on his given age from a later deposition, he would have been 19 at the time. England had just fought a civil war with more than 200, 000 dead and some of the countryside in ruin. The monarchy didn't return to power until 1660. In Virginia a headright system allowed the person who financed the transport of a person 100 acres of land. In the case of Thomas, William Debnam received land in the county of Gloucester, Virginia. Earlier he had and probably sold land in isle of Wight. It is not known where Thomas lived and what he did until the time of his marriage to Elizabeth Sheppard Jones in 1661. But it is likely that he was indentured and worked on someone's plantation, possibly that of Debnam. By the time of Debnam's death in 1657, Debnam owned

more 2100 acres.(2) The principal crop of the time was tobacco. Thomas's marriage to Elizabeth was advantageous. She was (likely?) the daughter of Robert Sheppard (1606-1651) and Prisilla Engham (1604-1643) (Previously listed as Elizabeth Spencer [1615- 1659]). And there was a plantation near Chippokes Creek that the heirs would receive at the time of Sheppard's death.(3) It must have been a fairly large estate as Sheppard deeded 1100 acres in 1652 and may have more.(4) (As an early immigrant, Elizabeth's father, Robert played an important role in government as well as the military. He was member of the house of burgess for James City county in 1646 and 1647.(5)) So where did Thomas Lane come from? According to Boddie, he says that many of the Isle of Wight families came from Gloucester or Devon. And it is possible that both Sheppard and his son-in-law could have come from SW England: Sheppard b. Feb 1606 in Rissington, Gloucester and a Lane, son of Thomas Lane and Margaret b. Nob 1734 in Musbury, Devon, England.(6) Both a member of this Lane family and a Westcott family have done Big Y DNA. They both have the a snp of R-FGC15217. The Westcott family can trace their ancestry back to Jeremiah Westcott (1632-1685) b. Somerset, England. Note this county borders on Gloucester and Devon. (Recent Big Y for 2 members the Lane family show that their terminal snp is R-A17861.) This needs further research. 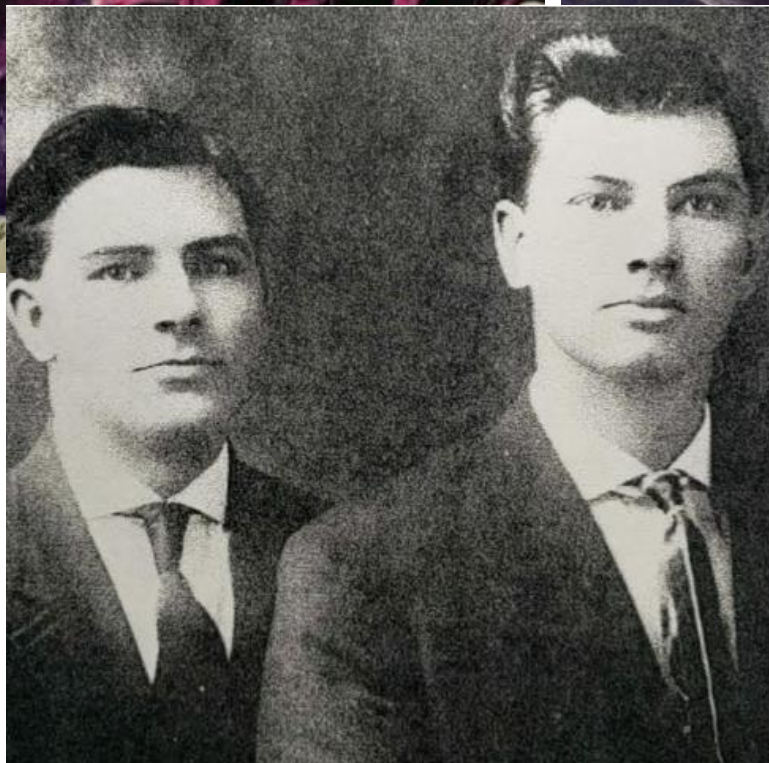

He was a prisoner of war twice during the Civil War. When he was released he walked from Illinois home in GA. He was awarded the Southern Cross by the Daughters of the Confederacy.

CONFEDERATE VETERANS ADOPTED RESOLUTIONS

MONTHLY MEETING HELD SATURDAY MORNING AT THE COURT HOUSE

The Joseph E. Johnston camp, United Confederate Veterans held the monthly meeting Saturday morning at the court house, the meeting being an interesting one for those members who attended.

During the meeting, Capt. R. P. Neal gave some interesting reminiscences of the Civil War, his talk being enjoyed by his comrades.

A committee, composed of Haney Fox, W. H. C. Freeman and J. W. Brooker, was appointed to draft resolutions on the death of Comrade O. D. Price, and prior to adjournment, the following resolutions were read and unanimously adopted by the camp:

We, the undersigned, have been appointed to draft a memoir of our late deceased comrade and fellow soldier, George Washington Hair, of Dawnville, Ga., who died the 9th day of August, 1914. It is with sadness we present the following brief tribute of respect to his memory:

Brother Hair served during the Civil War in Co., "C" 39th Georgia Volunteers, and his name also appears on the roll of the Joseph E. Johnston camp of United Confederate Veterans at Dalton, Georgia.

The deceased was quite young when he enlisted and was below the average size of our soldiers, but what he lacked in stature he more than made up in faithful

to visit us for a few days and I remember mama asking if she could help Grandma with her luggage. Grandma Emily replied, I don't have any. I started giggling when I saw the look on my mama's face when she realized Grandma had worn all the clothes she intended to need on the visit, layer upon layer." George Washington and Emily were married 46 years til his death on August 9, 1914 with a possible heart attack. They had eleven children that were raised on the 180 acres their dad bought for \$150.00 and an ole mule.

MR. GEORGE W. HAIR
DIED SUNDAY NIGHT

DECEASED WAS ONE OF COUNTY'S MOST
VALUED CITIZENS.

Mr. George W. Hair, aged 70 years, died at his home near Dawnville, Sunday night at 9 o'clock, following a brief illness, and in his passing, the county has lost one of its most valued citizens.

Mr. Hair was a well known and highly esteemed farmer, being a Confederate veteran and a loyal member of the Methodist church. He served with distinction throughout the Civil war, and was a prominent member of Joseph E. Johnston camp, United Confederate Veterans.

The deceased was one of the leading men in his community being respected and esteemed for the excellent gentleman he was. In church work he took a prominent part, as he did in all things for the betterment of his community. His loss will be missed by Georgians as well as neighbors.

Dawnville's Hair family celebrates heritage

George Washington Hair must have been smiling. The descendants of the Civil War veteran The Daily Citizen-News eulogized in August of 1914 as one of Whitfield County's "most valuable citizens" gathered at the 100-year-old historic Hair House in Dawnville recently to celebrate their heritage with the community.

Remodeled approximately 25 years ago as a salon, the home served as an open house shorn of beauty supplies and equipment over a weekend and was filled instead with photos, old newspapers and other "heirlooms," as they dubbed them. Keeping with their family's military background and agricultural roots, invitees included the Sons of Confederate Veterans Joseph E. Johnston Camp, the Peach State Antique Tractor Club and the Northwest Georgia Antique Auto Club.

"I love to listen to the engines," former farm boy Bill Cavender said of the tractors. The oldest one was a 1931 John Deere "D" model. His wife, Eugenia, serves with the Pvt. Drewry R. Smith chapter of the United Daughters of the Confederacy, which was on hand to help present military awards to family members. The chapter also placed a Southern Cross of Honor on G.W. Hair's grave in the Dawnville Cemetery commemorating his bravery while being imprisoned by the Union Army twice.

Upon being released from a Yankee prison after the Battle of Vicksburg in Mississippi, Hair reportedly walked back to Dawnville — enamored to marry his sweetheart and eventual lifelong mate, Emma Cady.

George Hair, 84, who with his brother Earl is one of the only two surviving members of the nine children of Clarence B. Hair (the son of G.W.), said the family farm was purchased in 1882.

“I was born and raised on this property,” he said. “I went to the front lines between Germany and France (in World War II) after only six to eight weeks of training. I was there for the liberation and stayed there a year after that.”

He came back to the farm and helped cultivate the main crops of corn and cotton, along with tomatoes and raising hogs. But he knew he would have to “take a side job” to make it as a farmer, and carried the mail on Route 4 for 20 years. He said he picked 2,500 pounds of tomatoes just last week, and sells them from his vegetable stand on Lower Dawnville Road, also known as Highway 286.

Earl Hair, 81, worked at The Daily Citizen for 43 years.

“It was nice, and an enjoyable day,” he said of the celebration. “We got to see a lot of people we hadn’t seen in some time. But I told them to get prepared to do it again in 19 years — that’s when I’ll turn 100!”

George was the son related to the bobcat attack of lore back in 1962 at the farm. His mother, Mrs. Clarence Hair, was outside when she heard a commotion in the henhouse. She grabbed a pitchfork and commenced stabbing a creature that had gotten ahold of one of her hens. She called George to help identify the animal that she thought was some kind of cat, since her husband was blind by that time and didn’t even know the fight was going on. The news of a 70-year-old great-grandmother killing the marauder made the Dalton and Atlanta newspapers.

Wanda Hair Taylor serves as the family historian.

“This celebration was dedicated to the Hair grandchildren, so they will have a sense of heritage in a world where the very essence of the word is dying,” she said. “I wanted them to gain a greater understanding of the word family, and this includes extended family. After it was over, I couldn’t quit crying. Seeing the people in the church who so long needed to be honored was overwhelming. But the tears were also the sadness of missing loved ones and remembering the good times, too.”

Brenda Hair Farmer summed it up: “It was our past, present and future — all at the same time!”
